SHROVE TUESDAY / FAT TUESDAY / MARDI GRAS PANCAKE FEAST

We will begin Lent this year with a pancake feast on Sunday, February 15, immediately following worship. Carnival, which comes from a Latin phrase meaning "removal of eat," is the three day period before Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. The day before Ash Wednesday is called Shrove Tuesday, or more popularly known by the French term Mardi Gras, meaning "Fat Tuesday," a contrast to the fasting during Lent. It is also known as Shrovetide ("shrove" is an Old English word meaning "to repent"). The entire three day period has now come to be known in many areas as Mardi Gras. During this Shrovetide, people partied and ate up all the fatty foods which were forbidden during the 40 days of Lent. Fat Tuesday was named from the custom of eating meat, eggs, fat, and milk. Often pancakes were the meal of the day, for people could consume much of the soon-to-be-forbidden food. Carnival or Mardi Gras is a period of celebration, originally a festival before the fasting during the season of Lent.

Many churches now observe Mardi Gras with a pancake meal, eating together as a community before the symbolic fasting of Lent begins. We are changing the tradition from Tuesday to Sunday.

Following our meal, we will burn the palms from Palm Sunday 2014 in order to have ash for our Ash Wednesday service. So, plan to come with a hungry stomach, as we celebrate the last few days before Lent begins. There will be pancake races, and mask-making, and coloring Alleluia banners that we will bury during Lent. If you have amazing skills flipping pancakes, talk to Pastor Cathy. We will definitely need help in the kitchen that day!

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE FEBRUARY 18TH 7 P.M. SANCTUARY

Join us for a meditative service at 7 p.m. to receive the imposition of ashes. In the ritual of Ash Wednesday, which begins the Lenten journey through the desert, we receive a cross-shaped smudge on our forehead. The ashen sign reminds us that we are dust, and to dust we will return. We begin this desert journey marked with ashes, the sign of our mortality. In remembering that we will die, we are called to remember God who is the source of our life. The season of Lent invites us into wilderness places where we remember what is most essential to us.



Pastor's Peace



A few years ago, Angie & I hiked miles and miles of the red rock trails in Sedona. During one hike, we got off the main trail. We were following up a wash (a dry creek bed) trying to find our way back to the trail. A feeling of uncertainty washed over us, a sense of feeling lost. We ended up backtracking quite a distance before we knew we were back on the right track. How did we know we were on the right path? Because we had learned to recognize a pile of rocks in a wire cage that designated the path. It was a moment to breathe a sigh of relief, knowing we were on the correct path. And it was significant to acknowledge so many who traveled this same journey, and to think that many more would come after we were gone, walking in the same footsteps.

These pile of rocks have a name: Cairn. And the symbol of the Cairn will lead us through the wilderness of the Lenten Journey. It is an inward journey, finding the cairns of life that point the spiritual path – through the life of Jesus in the Gospels, through spiritual practices, through personal experience. But the Lenten Journey is also communal – we are to become spiritual cairns that help others find their path of living a life in Christ.

As I did some research on cairns, I found this helpful summary from Wikipedia.

A cairn is an artificial pile of stones. They are built for several purposes.

- They may mark a burial site, to memorialize the dead.
- They may mark the summit of a mountain.
- Placed at regular intervals, they indicate a path across stony or barren terrain



The Inuit erect human-shaped cairns, or inuksuit as milestones or directional markers in the Canadian Arctic.

The word derives from the Scottish Gaelic càrn which has a much broader meaning, and can refer to various types of hills and natural stone piles. In Scotland, it is traditional to carry a stone up from the bottom of the hill to place on a cairn. In this way, cairns grow ever larger. Today cairns are often used to mark hiking trails or cross country routes in mountain regions. Most are small, but a few are built taller so as to protrude through a layer of snow. It is traditional for each person passing by a cairn to add a stone, as a small bit of maintenance to counteract the destructive effects of severe winter weather.

In the Faroe Islands, plagued by frequent fogs and heavy rain, with some of the highest sea cliffs in the world, cairns are a navigational marker over rugged and hilly terrain.

It is noteworthy that there is a Jewish tradition of placing small stones on a person's grave whenever you visit, as a token of respect instead of flowers. When you come for worship on Ash Wednesday, you will notice a cairn on the altar and possibly a few other places around the church. You will have an opportunity to participate in the Lenten journey by placing prayers in the rocks throughout Lent. This will be our symbol of finding the path that leads to Jesus, knowing that countless saints throughout the ages have travelled the same spiritual journey.



As we journey together, we will find the cairns of life that continue to point us to Christ.

Lenten Study - Video discussions from the theological work of Marcus Borg

Wednesdays - February 25th - March 25th; soup supper at 6; discussion ~ 6:45 pm

If someone asked me what contemporary theologian has had the most impact on my faith journey, I would tell you, without a doubt, Dr. Marcus Borg. I was saddened to hear this week that he died on January 21st at the age of 72 (far too young).

To honor his life and his life's work, we will be exploring a few of his videos during our Lenten journey. Each week we will receive a teaching from Marcus Borg, followed by lively discussion.

I first heard Marcus Borg speak in 1996 at University Temple in Seattle. I was almost 30 years old and beginning to question whether Jesus was the only path to God as I had been taught in church. During the question/answer session, someone asked the question I would never dare utter; "Do you think Jesus was the only Son of God?" The room grew eerily quiet as Marcus Borg contemplated the question. My heart almost stopped, and I gripped the pew in front of me. While not directly answering the question, Marcus Borg calmly stated, "I believe that Jesus exhibited the most transformational relationship with God, of any human being throughout history." Marcus Borg gave me language to articulate my growing and changing understanding of faith. He defined spirituality as an internal process of becoming conscious of and being intentional about a deepening relationship with God.

Join in the faith community at UCUP as we deepen our relationship with God and each other.
