From Pastor Cathy

Last Sunday afternoon, Robert Brown (UCUP's liaison to Faith Action Network) and I were attending the Tacoma Cluster FAN gathering to attempt to find ways to make our advocacy efforts more effective. In the midst of income inequality, gun violence, lack of Mental Health Programs & Services, increasing homelessness, Rev. Paul Benz, Co-Director of FAN, asked each of us what gives us hope. It didn't take me long to answer the question. I am so humbled and proud to serve in a congregation that not only worships, prays, sings, eats, and plays well with each other, you also put your spirituality and faith into action in so many areas - both as a church working together, and as individuals out in your own neighborhoods and places of work. If I added up all the ways individuals in our church make a lasting and positive difference in the greater community, it would be staggering.

Before attending the FAN Cluster, both Robert & I had just gathered with a dozen or so folks at the church and watched the movie "Inequality for All". Many thanks to Cathi Cline for introducing us to this 2012 documentary examining the widening income inequality in the United States, and how and why that has occurred. The film is presented by American economist, author, professor, and previous Secretary of Labor, Robert Reich. It is well worth watching if you didn't get the opportunity to view it with us.

It was a good follow-up from when Mike Yoder from Associated Ministries came to our church to congratulate UCUP for being one of the top 10 Associated Ministries supporters. He stayed afterward to talk about a plan for Tacoma to provide more housing for those experiencing homelessness. (See Judy Thierry's article in this newsletter).

In the midst of it, as a church we have been setting up, prepping for the families who come to us two times a year from Family Housing Network. From hanging bedroom partitions, making beds, grocery shopping, cooking, playing with children, eating with the families, doing laundry - our church has been offering hospitality to families who have very few places to turn to stay warm, safe and well fed for the night. We may not do it perfectly, and it may not be received perfectly, but what I do know is that it is done with love and the value of our Christian convictions. Of course, this would be the precise week that we discovered the furnace AND the dishwasher were not working, and even then, folks from the church stepped up to handle these inconveniences. More blankets and hands in warm sudsy dishwater to the rescue.

A number of us are also gearing up to either financially support or to put our feet to the ground participating in this year's Hunger Walk happening on October 2nd.

Everywhere I turn, UCUP is up to something - something good. And this indeed gives me hope. And I know, WE ARE NOT ALONE. We are surrounded by so many others who hold social justice synonymous with their faith and values. And best of all, we are held in the net of grace and the loving outstretched arms of a compassionate Creator. May our work be blessed and so be a blessing to all we meet.





From Our President



Our church board met last night (September 19, 2016), and we together decided that more discussion needs to happen before we present the constitution for a vote. We are pleased with the work we have done, but at least a few questions remain in the minds of some congregants who have taken the time to review it. We realized that we members of the board have had ample time with each section of the constitution, but that members have not had this rich time. We believe that it would be constructive to present the constitution at our scheduled meeting after church on October 16, but that the constitution will be under review that day, such that members might ask questions. Since the meeting is scheduled anyway, we may have other issues to bring to your attention, but our thought is to hold off a vote on the constitution until our annual meeting and charge conference in January.

In other board news, we decided to accept a purchase contract for a new copier, rather than continue a lease. This change will happen over the next month, as our lease expires in November. The net effect of purchasing a copier is lower monthly payments. We also are looking to install a front door that will open automatically. We are getting bids for this now, and we already have some in.

We are excited about upcoming events, such as the Pierce County Hunger Walk on October 2, the October 5 Fundraiser for My Sister's Pantry (6:00-8:00 P.M. at The Hub), serving at My Sister's Pantry on October 22, and our upcoming Fourth Sunday Forums, including September 25's showing of Inequality for All.

Of Mountains and Methodism

I may not be a fast or accomplished mountain climber, but I am persistent. I've been climbing for about 30 years. I didn't realize I was climbing the first few years, more like wandering the forest. I barely noticed the incline. I knew I could turn back any time or stop and rest for long periods of time. But at some point the mountain learned my name and began to tease me forward and upward, one step at a time.

Feeling more accomplished, and even with a sense of pride, I reached the summit, only to realize it was just a foothill. The real mountain lay behind and above my climb. The mountain is called Methodism. It's a LOT bigger than United Methodism and my journey has only begun. I do know that going back down is not an option, nor is staying where I am. The mountain knows my name and it calls me onward.

I thought I knew Methodism; I've been a Methodist for 30 years. I know what our churches look like, from the traditional tower front, to the pews filled with grey haired seniors struggling to keep the church alive. I can recite the order of worship and predict that the coffee hour will last longer than the sermon. I know which issues will divide us and which will unite us. I was feeling pretty darn smug about it.

Then I attended the World Methodist Conference in Houston last week. It didn't look like our General Conference at all. They sang differently – out loud and with movement! Sermons and Bible Studies brought the audience to its feet shouting and affirming. We sang together, each their own native language and it was not chaos.

At first I noticed the many differences, the clothing, the favorite songs, the preaching styles. There were many different kinds of Methodists there and I was intent on understanding those differences. Even those parables so familiar to me and clear in interpretation could be interpreted differently.

The conference theme was “ONE”. The challenge to me was to move through my initial reaction of difference and pay attention to what was underneath. The teaching of the Gospel was our common foundation and the wisdom of John Wesley connected all of us. We may branch in different directions, but we come from one common root. Here are some snippets of the many sermons and Bible studies that caught my attention.

- Oneness is not “connectivity”, sameness or exclusivity. It is community, variety and ALL, without exception.
- Restoring oneness requires confession, grace and forgiveness. When truth is used without grace it divides us.
- Privilege damages. It damages both the privileged and non-privileged.
- Change happens when we cross the street for love. Love is our driver, not judgment.

- Unity of Christians is powerful, dangerous and threatening. We are millions, with a voice, a common mission and can choose to be heard; o make a difference.
- Something new is trying to be born.
- As the lion and lamb can come together, so can justice and mercy.
- Oneness is about unity AND moving forward. We have been called for transformation, our work is not done once we build a church and open the doors.

I do not have conclusions or interpretations for these comments. I can not fold them up and put them away for they continue to call to me. They have become the “thinking points” for my mind and heart. What I do know is that we are and can continue to be one. From conservative to liberal, from established communities of faith to fledgling ones, from 159 countries and through 139 languages, we are one. Now, surveying tomorrow from the top of my foothill I see many more and taller mountains. I have been outfitted well by John Wesley. I am ready for the journey.

Septembers 4th Sunday Forum

Mr. Yoder shared that the Pierce County (PC) participation in the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) one-day count of the homeless statistics revealed 1750 individuals, 400 of which were children. This number is up 35% and while it may be in part an artifact of better canvassing the issue begs smarter action. Regardless of the numbers, AM for the past 6 years has been on the front lines as it has morphed into a professional services delivery agency in its middle age (47 years in existence) – and it is sensing that a new direction is required. Mike's call to us during our Sunday Forum is for the interfaith community to become aware, adopt and support a "Housing First" policy versus a poorly working "housing ready" stance. It is turning on its head the myth that homeless people of whatever circumstances need to be "ready" or attain some "special status" to move into safe shelter. Many families with small children live on the streets, in tents, sleep in cars or find shelter in abandoned buildings. Of the 13,000 calls to AM in 2015, 4,000 "met criteria" and 800 were placed! This is unacceptable. In January 2016 AM put a stake in the ground and said that it will address by 2025 = house and support 100% of the families who are homeless annually, which means rehousing and returning to community. Utah ten-year road to success and reduction of homeless by 90% is the template and it concerns communities of faith. This is the critical challenge and "redesign need" that is unfolding in Pierce County; all while it confronts a dearth of mental health beds (2.6/100K= a MH desert), > 40% self-described MH needs of surveyed clients, Seattle level construction costs, poor existing housing stock labeled as "tough and not enough," and a tax adverse PC council that cannot tolerate even a 0.1 of 1% local taxing jurisdiction hike, and so forth. The county faces across its institutions, private landlords, and over 600 faith based churches a call to "open doors" and take its homeless in. There is more to come on this endeavor. PC commissioner elections will have as part of their issues mental health services. "I was hungry,...I was in prison..." – Matthew 25:35.
