
On August 13, without fanfare, my husband, Clint and I crossed from Montana into Idaho on I-90. It was a pilgrimage from Denver to Seattle; from one rich chapter of life and ministry in the Mountain Sky

Area into another, unknown chapter in the Greater Northwest Area. How do you enter a new place? Or how do you re-enter a familiar place after many years? How does a leader join multiple teams each with its own habits and traditions, its quirks, taboos and preferences?

In Luke 10, Jesus sends his followers to places they had never been before with instructions to "carry no purse, no bag, no sandals" (Luke 10). He tells them to offer only a blessing of peace and to receive the hospitality offered them by strangers who receive their blessing. They are to heal the sick and tell them that the Kingdom of God "is right on your doorstep".

Sounds like a gentle kind of evangelism, grounded in vulnerability, mutual respect, shared resources and healing relationships. Can it be that the Kingdom of God is there on the doorstep – the threshold – where guest and host exchange blessings and meet one another?

I'm thinking of this year as a threshold. Throughout the year I will travel to a variety of places for "threshold events" where we will meet and bless one another. In June, we'll cross the threshold into new relationship with a service of installation during the joint Annual Conference session of the Oregon-Idaho and Pacific Northwest Conferences, with representatives from Alaska joining us as well. God is at work in the world, sending us to new places to meet new people. We are blessed to be a blessing!



## Second Annual Epiphany Celebration Friday, January 6th - 6 p.m.

Join us in the Fellowship Hall for a Soup Supper, our Celtic Spiral Service, and to share our King's Cake.

A new tradition was started last year with an Epiphany celebration complete with a Spiral Service, and King's Cake. Come at 6pm for a simple soup supper.

We will then gather around the Spiral made of Evergreen Boughs, with a Christ Candle lit in the center. The Spiral Service, though not Celtic in origin, draws heavily upon the symbolism of the light and the cycle of the seasons which permeates the Spirituality of the Celtic Christians; a carry-over from the pagan Celts. In many cultures the spiral is a symbol of infinity, eternity, or God. On this evening, our Spiral service will remind us all that each one of us bears a light within – kindled by God and through Christ – to light our way through the physical darkness of winter and through the season of Epiphany. A labyrinth of evergreens will be laid out on the floor with stars scattered throughout the boughs. A white Christ candle is placed in the center. Each participant will make a journey into the middle where, one by one, we will light our own candle from the Christ candle, journey back out of the spiral to exchange our lit candle for a star on in the spiral. The Star reminds us of the guiding light that led the Wise men and Shepherds to the birthplace of the Christ Child. That light is still there to guide us in our own personal journey throughout Epiphany.

After the Spiral service, we will feast on a traditional King's Cake, with three hidden treasures and discover who the Wise Ones are for the next year.

### **Sunday Forum January 29th at 11:30am Topic: Living Safely on a Dynamic Earth Led By: Duncan Foley**

Really? Learning about safe living in a land of earthquakes and other geologic hazards can be fun? Come learn how to live an aware life, not a fearful one, in our geologically active part of the planet.

Learn about local risks. Dynamic geologic processes bring us the mountains, hills, valleys, rivers, and shorelines that make the Pacific Northwest a highly desirable place to live. They also bring us volcanoes, earthquakes, lahars, landslides, floods, and tsunamis. How do we get ready for rare but high consequence events? What is resilience and why is it important? What free steps can you take today that will help you respond to and recover from geologic events, and help you resume your life?

Duncan Foley has taught, written about, and lead community workshops in geologic hazards for more than 40 years.



## Family Housing Network Hosting the Families

For the second year, our Fellowship Hall will be 'home' for homeless families working to regain their independence within the Family Housing Network for a second week in February.

We and Mt. Cross Lutheran, our neighbors and longtime partners in this mission, will provide meals and hosts for the families from Feb. 11 through Feb. 18, and though the families will remain in the Fellowship Hall from Feb. 18 through the morning of Feb. 25, Family Housing Network's main office will be responsible for arranging meals and hosts during that second week.

We'll need volunteers to set up the space the evening of Feb. 10 and the morning of Feb. 11, and especially volunteers to provide main dishes, side dishes and other food and supplies for the kitchen.

Look for further details in the February newsletter and during announcements at Sunday worship. Sign-up sheets will appear as usual toward the end of January, and there are plans in the works to conduct an orientation session Feb. 4 from 9am-noon, to welcome new volunteers for this mission, and acquaint longtime volunteers with some changes in the overall program.
