Some of you will be asked to fill out the Washington State Patrol background check on behalf of UCUP if you work with children & youth. A light lunch will be served. Anticipate the training to last 90 minutes.

October 21st Join us At the Movies in the Fellowship Hall for COCO - 11:30 a.m.




Sometime this past year, Pamela Maddess made a suggestion that to view the movie "Coco" together as a congregation. I had not yet seen the movie that was released fall of 2017, which turned out to be the largest grossing film of all time in Mexico, and won the Oscar for the Best Animated Feature Film in 2018! I finally watched the movie this past summer, and was so enamored by it, I quickly coordinated with Pamela to set a date on the church's calendar to watch the movie together. Pamela offered to put together a simple meal following worship that will lead into the movie. You definitely do not want to miss that.

In the movie, the protagonist, Miguel, a 12-year-old boy, loves music, and is trying to get out from under the shadow of his great-great-grandfather, who left his family to pursue a career as a musician. The family instituted a permanent household ban on music after that. Miguel, with a strong passion for music, teaches himself to play the guitar in secret. Coco's story begins on *Día de los Muertos*, the Day of the Dead. Miguel's family has devoted an entire room to a shrine where they have perched photos of departed family members, all in preparation for a visitation from their ancestors. The movie depicts Miguel's dream journey crossing over to the Day of the Dead, where people are remembered only if their photo is on display on the ofrendas, the altars that are at the center of every *Día de los Muertos* celebration.

It's a story of a multigenerational matriarchy, a story of conflict and disappointment, sadness and loss, as well as presenting death as a life-affirming inevitability. It's a film that reminds us of our need to remember, even the painful parts we'd prefer to forget. In a fast paced, technological world, Coco provokes some thoughtful questions about the significance of memory. Why should we remember? What do we lose by forgetting? How do we remember the hard, painful things of life without forgetting the beauty in the process?

As we approach the annual remembrance in our liturgical calendar of All Saints' Worship (on November 4th this year; Get names to Lynne before Oct. 29th), the day when we remember and honor in a sacred way all those who have passed from this earthly life into life eternal, I invite you to join me in watching the movie Coco. It is a way of being in solidarity with another culture in their tradition of remembering those who have died. It is also an opportunity to remember our own beloved ones, in preparation to our All Saints Worship, to be surrounded in the knowledge that God is with us in the midst of grief and sadness, that we are not alone.

For all the saints, who from their labours rest,
Who Thee by faith before the world confessed,
Thy Name, O Jesus, be forever blessed. Alleluia, Alleluia!
O blest communion, fellowship divine! We feebly struggle, they in glory shine;
Yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine. Alleluia, Alleluia!



In our end is our beginning; in our time, infinity;
In our doubt there is believing; in our life, eternity,
In our death, a resurrection; at the last, a victory,
Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

Well, Fall has certainly fallen! As if a switch was flipped, days are cooler, clouds have returned, and the rains have come again. Our community here at UCUP, I believe, can and does help to exemplify those twin values of working for justice and listening to those with whom we differ, or who have different experiences than ours. It is just one of the many things that makes this church special. As we move into October, we have more specific opportunities to grow and support this community. The annual Stewardship Campaign will be kicking off soon, which you will be hearing much more about in the coming weeks. It is an annual ritual that most of us who have been part of this or other church communities are familiar with, much like the NPR fund drive and campaign ads; however, I ask you to take some intentional time as we come into this Stewardship season to consider what you are able and called to give to support the many ministries of UCUP. Certainly our financial contributions are a major piece of this, but so too is our time and talent. UCUP is remarkable in many ways, but one of them is how large a percentage of our membership is engaged in the life of the church. Yet, in the past several years we had many new people join us, and not everyone has found the place to share their abilities. As you consider how to share what you can with this community to help it remain vital, please

consider what skills, time, or abilities you have that you could share, as well as what areas you are passionate about engaging with. If you are wondering what the opportunities are, more information will be provided to you soon through the campaign, but you can also always ask me or another member of the Board, or just the person next to you!

There are four interesting and important Faith Action Network events coming up. The first on the calendar is a Candidates' Forum. We are working with FAN and other churches in our network to put on this event. We will have the opportunity to question the four candidates who are involved in the legislative district 28's elections. The event is from **7:00-9:00 P.M. on Tuesday, October 9**. It will be held at Lakewood Presbyterian Church. Please make plans to come.

The second event is a potluck dinner hosted by Immanuel Presbyterian Church, a relatively new member of FAN. This potluck is for any member of any church that has joined FAN as well as individual FAN members not attached to a church. The main idea of this event is to make connections with others in the general Tacoma area who are members of FAN. So far as I know, there is no formal program, but there may be speakers. I know that Amber Dickson intends to speak up about the other two future events. This potluck is scheduled for **5:00-7:00 P.M. on that Sunday, October 21**. Please include this on your calendar.

The third event is the FAN Cluster gathering. This will be held at Bethany Presbyterian Church from **7:00-9:00 PM on Thursday, November 8**. The purpose of the cluster gathering, which for years has been held in September here, is to meet with our fellow churches to discuss what is going on in our faith communities to support our Faith Action mission. It also serves to discuss issues which we plan to bring forward on our Interfaith Advocacy Day in January or February. At this meeting, we will also be able to discuss political realities, given that it is just two days after the election.

The final of these four events is the Faith Action Network Annual Dinner, which is the primary fundraiser for FAN. This dinner will be held at the Renton Pavilion on **Sunday evening, November 18**, which is the Sunday prior to Thanksgiving. Typically, there are some very interesting speakers at these meals, and we, as a church, sponsor a table. I hope to do this again this year, so please talk to me about your plans to attend. If you need some financial support, this possibly can be provided. We have done this for several years.

Hurricane & Typhoon Relief

Please consider relief for those who endured Hurricanes on the Atlantic Coast and Typhoon Mangkhut ravaging the Philippines and Northern Mariana Islands. In every natural disaster, lives unravel in ways that take months or years to put back together. Donations to support relief efforts will be split between United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and UCC Disaster Relief. Simply put disaster relief on the memo line of your check. You can give online at www.umcor.org/donate and include church name when you give so it will be recognized. Pray for the people whose lives are disrupted and for those who are responding.

Family Housing Network has suspended operations until at least the end of this year as administrators attempt to unravel the causes of an abrupt decrease in participation in the program, which since the mid-90's has sheltered up to five homeless families at a time in area churches, schools and other facilities.

UCUP was gearing up to take on a week in addition to our long-scheduled Sept. 29-Oct. 6 dates when word came from the agency that the program has been put on hold.

When we sheltered families last, in February of this year, we hosted roughly two dozen people; by the time our partners at Mt. Cross sheltered families over Memorial Day week, there were only 6, and there have been periods during which no families at all were taking part in the program.

But the problem of homelessness in Pierce County has not been solved, and it seems likely that the program could be restarted in some form early next year. UCUP has been a strong supporter of the program since its inception.
