




Mardi Gras/Fat Tuesday Pancake Feast Sunday, March 3rd

We will celebrate the end of the season of Epiphany and the beginning of Lent with a pancake feast following worship on Sunday, March 3rd at 11:30am. There will be pancake races, mask-making, and coloring Alleluia banners, and burning the palms for our Ash Wednesday service.



Ash Wednesday March 6th at 7 PM

Join us for a meditative service at 7 p.m. to receive the imposition of ashes. In the ritual of Ash Wednesday, which begins the Lenten journey through the desert, we receive a cross-shaped smudge on our forehead. The ashen sign reminds us that we are dust, and to dust we will return.



Lenten Soup Suppers & Study - We Make the Road by Walking Wednesday evenings 6-8pm - March 13, 20, 27, April 3 & 10

Join us as we make our way through the portions of Brian McLaren's book - "We Make the Road By Walking" that focus on Lent and Holy Week. Worship and Sermon Series during Lent - The Seven Deadly Needs

You've likely heard of the Seven Deadly Sins, developed in the 5th century by the early church. (gluttony, lust, greed, anger, acedia/sloth, envy, and pride). But this Lent, we'll explore the **Seven Deadly Needs**. They are, perhaps, more subtle than the famous Sins, but just as dangerous – and don't enhance relational harmony with others, oneself or with God. The series will be based on Edward Bear's book, *The Seven Deadly Needs*, but takes a secular idea and explores it from an attitude of discipleship. The seven deadly needs listed below can get you in the same kind of trouble as the 7 deadly sins. Digging for information that's not your business, having over the top reactions, allowing ego infestations to affect your life, setting yourself up as judge and jury are a few of the 7 deadly needs. The needs themselves are not evil – what makes them deadly is that we are tempted to use these things to fill space in our lives that should be reserved for God.

From Pastor Cathy

The United Methodist Church made countless headlines this week in the Seattle Times, NPR, New York Times and countless other news organizations in the worst possible way, as the global UMC adopted even more restrictive language with even more punitive consequences for LGBTQ clergy, and clergy who choose to officiate at same gender weddings; and punitive consequences for Bishops who refuse to uphold the Book of Discipline. For the very first time in my 17 years of ministry the thought occurred to me, "I could lose my ordination because of who I am and who I chose to be my life-partner and spouse." That was a sobering thought. And it turns out the conservative take-over of this denomination has adopted the "Traditionalist Plan", even as the Judicial Council will most likely find it largely unconstitutional.

While I know that God's grace is bigger than any one denomination, I am soul-weary and sad for the heart and soul of the UMC. For 12 of the 17 years I have been a pastor, I served in silence in an unofficial "Don't ask, don't tell" denomination. Five years ago I invoked the spiritual practice of testimony on Transfiguration Sunday after consulting and discerning with leadership about whether the church was ready to receive my story. At the time my decision to be "closeted" was more about not splitting the church I was serving apart, than fear that charges could be brought against me and I could be brought up on trial. Thankfully, I am one of the "lucky" ones serving in a conference that has become more accepting with each passing year. I have been truly blessed to have had the support of Bishop Grant Hagiya, Bishop Elaine Stanovsky, and ALL my District Superintendents. But that isn't the case for many of the hidden faithful who serve in less accepting conferences.

The decision made at General Conference 2019 is not reflective of the values and ministry of the Pacific Northwest Conference or the Western Jurisdiction (comprising conferences from the Rocky Mountains to the west). Our conference is becoming known for its inclusiveness and welcome for all God's children.

The Western Jurisdiction and the PNW will continue to commit ecclesiastical disobedience to take a stand against the ugly exclusive actions taken today by the global church. Thankfully, this church, United Church in University Place, a UMC/UCC congregation, will continue to welcome and be in ministry to all people - and to LGBTQIA+ sisters and brothers who have been told by the UMC that they are somehow unworthy of full acceptance. I am grateful to be in ministry at such an accepting, hospitable, welcoming church. You welcomed Angie and me into ministry with open arms and hearts, and we continue to be profoundly grateful.

From the Western Jurisdiction Bishops and Delegates

We have long appreciated the richness of the global diversity of our United Methodist Church and have embraced opportunities to join with you all in the work of making disciples for the transformation of the world. We also understand the purpose of the Church to be in mission and ministry. Consequently, we in the West have been functioning for years as One Church committed to full inclusion, seeking to be a home for all God's people. Today we acknowledge the fracture of this body, yet we worship a God who tells us that the body of Christ has many parts, all equally valued. Rooted in Wesleyan tradition, grounded in Scripture and committed to mission and ministry, the Western Jurisdiction intends to continue to be one church, fully inclusive and open to all God's children, across the theological and social spectrum.

From President Jeffrey Kuan - my Seminary Professor at PSR who is now President of Claremont School of Theology

After four days in St. Louis, MO, as one of 864 delegates to The UMC's special Session of the General Conference, I am angry and heartbroken by the decision of the body not only to continue its injustices toward our LGBTQIA community but also to strengthen the prohibitions and punishments for those clergypersons who do not uphold the injustice.

I am heartbroken for the church universal, and for clergy members of this institution, and for future leaders. This conference was supposed to lead a divided church on a path forward, but instead we took a giant step backward.

I am angry about the politics that were employed before and during this conference. I am angry about the ways the Bible has been, and continues to be, weaponized against people of God. And I am angry about the time, money, and energy that have been expended over the last forty-seven years to hurt and divide us. The decisions that were made this week have inflicted violence on the body of Christ, and that trauma will be felt for generations.

In spite of this or because of this, I am more resolved than ever to work toward a church that is inclusive for all – in the pews and in the pulpit. Though weary, heartbroken, and angry, I am not without hope. There is much work ahead, but we are not alone. Those of us in the Western Jurisdiction (and others across the denomination) will continue to live out a One Church spirit, no matter the cost.

And without a doubt, Claremont School of Theology will continue to be an institution not only inclusive to the LGBTQIA community, but also deeply and ardently committed to demonstrating, teaching, and advocating for God's love and mercy to all creation. We will continue to recognize the gifts of LGBTQIA people and to provide the kind of theological education that encourages, supports, and prepares Christian leaders to live out a calling faithful to a just and love-filled Gospel.


Together, we will continue to work to repair the brokenness in our hearts, in our congregations, and in our communities.

from United Methodist Communications

Who are they?

- Seekers are more likely to be female than male (6 out of 10 are female)
- A large proportion are unmarried (42% married, 58% single)
- About half have kids under 18 (47% Children <18, 53% No children)
- Seekers are a diverse population (65% Caucasian, 22% Hispanic, 18% Black, 5% Asian, 4% Other)

What are they looking for in a church?

- Knowing that everyone will be welcoming: 32%
- Making friends and nurturing relationships: 29%
- Support during difficult times: 28%
- Finding out more about God: 27%

Genuine community is the top driver of continued attendance. 3 out of 4 say friendly and welcoming people and feeling part of a community make them want to continue to attend a church.

4th Sunday Forum

February's 4th Sunday forum hosted by the Greening Committee brought together over 15 UCUP members to discuss faithful advocacy as fostered through Earth Ministries to which UCUP is a member. Jessica Zimmerle, a seminary student at Seattle University, and Kathy Holmes from Earth Ministries in one brief hour laid out the local and state issues that call people of faith to environmental justice and action. We discussed:

- Stool leg #1: What does your individual faith require of you in caring for the earth?
- Stool leg #2: What is UCUP's moral foundation for environmental justice?
- Stool leg #3: How can we use our individual and collective voice now and here in Washington?

The 100% clean electricity Senate Bill 5116/House Bill 1211 need your voice among other earth ministry legislative priorities for 2019 the processes of which extend out to 2045 — yes! 25 years from now.

Know your district number for your state senator and representative(s) and contact information. Call, leave phone messages, send emails and hand written individual letters by US post. One small voice equals 100 voices, seven messages or letters are enough to move a representative's understanding and vote.


Earth Letters posted on the bulletin board take up all the facets of faithful stewardship of God's creation.

A one page handout on how to share your story with a legislator begins with "I am a person of faith and a member of United Church in University Place. As a person of faith I value...caring for the earth, working together, treating all people with dignity and respect, honesty and integrity, safety over profit, leaving a better world for future generations, fairness and equity, real democracy, responsibility.... please support the following:

- 100% electricity
- a clean fuel standard
- the oil spill prevention act
- the pollution prevention for our future act
- the reusable bag act.
