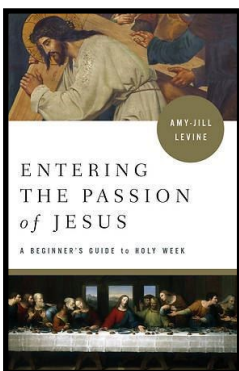
### Celebrate our Gifts and Plan for the Future at All-Church Retreat

### LENT WORSHIP SERIES & LENT STUDY - ENTERING THE PASSION



Join us during the season of Lent, both in worship and in study, as we focus on the main events of Holy Week, from Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, to the Garden of Gethsemane from a uniquely Jewish point of view brought to us by Dr. Amy-Jill Levine in her book *Entering the Passion of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week*. Dr. Levine compares the 40 days of Lent to the 10 days between Rosh HaShanah (Jewish New Year) and Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement) when Jews examine their consciences and make amends for the sins committed in the past year. The idea, as with Lent, is to reflect and repent, to become a better, more caring, more compassionate, person as we respond to ethical and spiritual questions. Our Lent study will offer an opportunity to discuss what was presented during Sunday worship.

Join the study on *either*:

- Sunday mornings from 8:45-9:45am on March 2, 9, 16, 23, 30 & April 5th (facilitated by Angie Wolle)
- **OR** Wednesday evenings from 6-8pm - March 4, 11, 18, 25 & April 1st (facilitated by Leslie Ann Knight, Tanya Sorenson and Angie Wolle)

The Wednesday evening study will include a simple soup supper. See Cathi Cline if you are able to provide soup. The rest of us will provide fruit/veggies and other easy snacks.

Books are \$10. Please let Pastor Cathy know if you would like to purchase one. We plan to order more if desired.

### Emergency Food Network to Present Fourth Sunday Forum



A representative from the Emergency Food Network will present a Fourth Sunday Forum following the worship service on March 22. Claire Grubb, Development Coordinator for the EFN, will provide an update on how the network is serving 80 food pantries, meal sites, and shelters in Pierce County. The Emergency Food Network provides 14 million pounds of healthy, nutritious food annually for distribution to families and individuals in need. There are more than 1.3 million visits to food pantries and meal sites in the county each year, and 54 percent of these visits are children and seniors. The forum will take place at 11:30 a.m. in the Orchard View Room.

## 2020 Church Budget

At the annual meeting and charge conference meeting on January 26, 2020, the UCUP congregation voted to approve the 2020 budget proposed by the Finance Committee and previously approved by the Board. An overall summary of the budget and a comparison with 2019 is shown in the table below:

What do these numbers tell us?

We finished 2019 in the black after planning for being nearly \$12,000 in the red. What happened? We changed how the staff payroll was managed in 2019, and as a result of the timing of payroll expenses, we only had 11 months of expenses in 2019. That particular scenario won't happen again in 2020. Additional savings were realized when we were unable to fill the Sunday school teacher position.

The approved 2020 budget identifies a nearly \$9,000 deficit. The original budget and resulting deficit would have been even larger, but the board made the difficult decision to cut the unfilled Sunday school teacher position. Putting additional resources toward our children and youth is a goal that the church will likely want to revisit as we plan for our future.

What does a deficit mean for the church? It means that we will likely need to dip into our savings to cover budgeted expenses in 2020. The church has a sizeable nest egg: on the order of \$160,000 invested with the UCC and UMC families of investment funds. The budgeted 2020 deficit represents about 6% of our savings. We are taking steps to move \$10,000 into a low risk, money-market type fund so that it is protected from a sudden crisis in the financial markets in the event that we need it this year to cover the deficit. While having to spend 6% of our savings isn't an emergency by any means, it's clearly not sustainable over the long run.

What can be done to mitigate the deficit? The Finance Committee recommended several actions at the February Board Meeting. First, to communicate to the congregation the fact that we have a deficit budget in 2020. Second, to hold a fundraising event of some kind in 2020. The Board is considering a combination silent auction/dinner/choir performance, to be held mid-year. Finally, the Communications Committee is considering ways to better advertise that we have space available for rent.

What can individual congregation members do? Lots! Get involved with planning the fundraising event, donate items for the silent auction, put a little extra in the plate on Sunday, and if you can, increase your pledge for 2020.

We met at about 8:30 for registration at United Churches of Olympia, spent the opening session in the sanctuary listening to FAN's leaders, heard from new Speaker of the House, Laurie Jenkins and Rabbi Goldstein. After this, we met with members of our legislative districts, and then had two workshop sessions on five different issues. Workshops

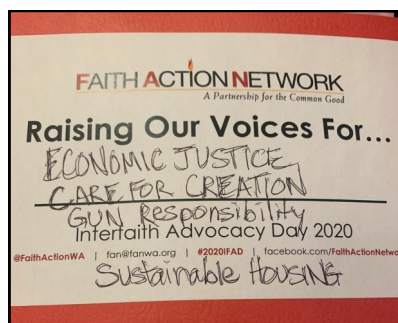
were led by Earth Ministry, the Alliance for Gun Responsibility, Washington Immigrant Solidarity Network, FAN's health care work group, and Washington Low Income Housing Alliance. These sessions allowed us to have access to information which we could later share with our legislators.


