The stewardship committee has been having some fun with the stewardship theme this year, and I hope you are enjoying our UCUP Stewardship Weekend Updates inspired by Saturday Night Live. The stewardship campaign will wrap up on Thankful Sunday, November 22nd.

In "normal" years, the congregation offers their pledges during the service on Thankful Sunday and we all celebrate afterwards downstairs with a Thankful Dinner. Needless to say, that will not be happening this year!

Instead, on the 22nd after our virtual church service, the stewardship committee will set up and operate a booth at the physical church to receive your pledge sheets for 2021. In the spirit of the Thankful Dinner, the Stewardship Committee will be operating a food drive for My Sister's Pantry at the pledge booth. So, as a first act of stewardship, in addition to your pledge sheet, bring by one or more items for the food drive. FROM OUR PASTOR

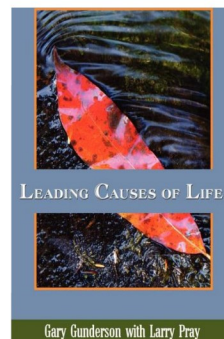
Excerpt from first sermon of Sermon Series LEADING CAUSES OF LIFE - October 18th

We are in the 8th month of a global pandemic that continues to wreak havoc throughout the world and in our personal lives. There have been times when I have been hopeful as the curve flattened, only to have those hopes dashed with a new uptick in cases. Worldwide there are 40 million cases with over a million deaths. Our grieving hearts and minds cannot comprehend these numbers. We've learned a lot about co-morbidities and underlying health conditions, and the potential long-lasting health risks if we contract this virus. COVID is now the 3rd leading cause of death in the U.S. behind heart disease and cancer. It has surpassed injuries, lung disease & diabetes. The impacts of the pandemic are enough to make non-anxious people anxious, and is wreaking havoc with people's mental health. It reminds me of the line in the 1662 version of the Anglican Book of Common Prayer that Composer John Rutter used in writing "Agnus Dei": *"In the midst of life we are in death"*. The Rutter Requiem is filled with darkness and light, despair and hope, with minor and major keys, with jarring dissonance and sweet melody, with death and with life. For some the more discordant parts of the Requiem speak with greater resonance for these dark days. Yet the opposite is true as well - In the midst of death, we are in life. These words from Scripture speak to the way we are invited to live our lives.

Deuteronomy 30:19 - *I have set before you life and death, blessings and cursings; therefore, choose life, that both you and your descendants may live.*

Gospel of John 10:10 - *I have come to give you Life and give it abundantly.*

These verses are the premise of the book for our sermon series for the next 6 weeks, *"The Leading Causes of Life"* written by UMC pastor Gary Gunderson & UCC pastor Larry Pray. In the book they encourage us to focus energy and attention on what affirms life rather than what threatens or destroys it. What ingredients make for a meaningful life? Those things that bubble up from within us and through us that give us a sense of richness, fullness, and satisfaction that make for what we call *abundant life*.



A hymn from the New Century Hymnal is based on an adaptation by Hindu Upanishads author Satish Kumar.

*Lead us from death to life, from falsehood to truth; from despair to hope, from fear to trust;
Lead us from hate to love, from war to peace. Let peace fill our heart, our world, our universe.*

These are great aspirations, but how do we live that out? Gunderson and Pray believe that there are 5 leading causes of life: Connection, Coherence, Generativity, Agency and Hope. You might come up with a slightly different list, but this is a good place to start - so throughout November, we will be focusing on these five Leading Causes of Life starting with Connection.

Hebrews 10:22: *"Let us keep encouraging each other, and let us not, as some have done, forsake gathering together."* Well, we may not be gathering physically together, but we have not stopped meeting and worshiping together. I have to say I am encouraged, even a bit surprised, by the consistent number of about 50 boxes that show up on zoom every Sunday morning. But we aren't just boxes that look like the Brady Bunch or the Hollywood squares. Each box contains a precious life or two or three, named and claimed as a beloved child of God, and connected to one another and to God like the vine is connected to the tree.

The root of the word "religion" - is *relegare* - or *ligament* - meaning "to bind, to connect together". Churches can be places of connection. They can be places of wounding, but they can also be places of healing. Physical healing happens when two sides of a wound reach toward each other and bind together. Healing can happen for us when we connect to the Source of All Being, to the Healer Jesus, who always guides us toward each other. And so we are connected to one another.

50 years ago, the people who made up the congregations of Mayflower UCC and Aldersgate UMC, looked at each other as friends who already knew each other, and also as strangers, who took a risk, trusting that joining and connecting together as one church community would make them spiritually stronger. And so, United Church in University Place came to be in January 1970, 50 years ago!!!

What has kept UCUP going these 50 years in being part of two different denominations whose organizational structures are quite different? I would say it arises out of people who have a deep faith in God, and a genuine and authentic community who share a deep connection with one another.

Let us heed the words of scripture to not give up meeting together and to remember the words from Ephesians 2:22 - *"In Christ you are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God"*. Having a faith community where people love, look out for and care for each other, and pray for each other is one of the things that makes for a long, rich, and satisfying life. Connection is a Leading cause of Life.

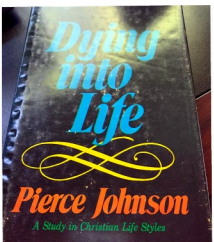


Meanwhile, Sheila and Judy were beautifying our grounds by planting pansies in various locations and trimming back a few bushes so people could read our readerboard a little easier.

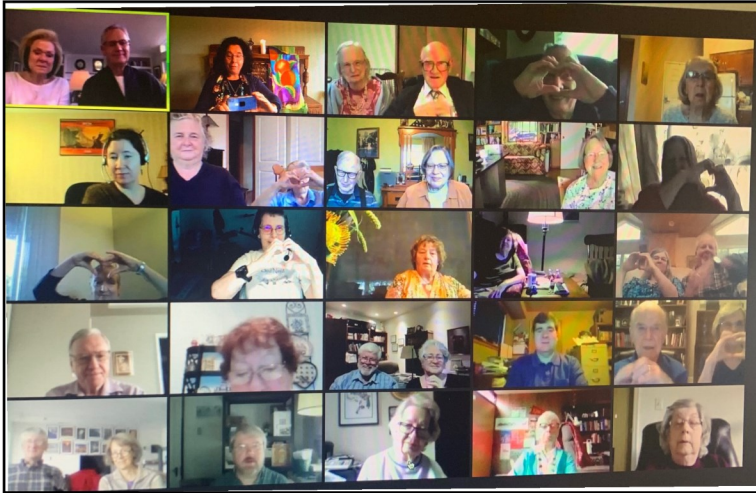

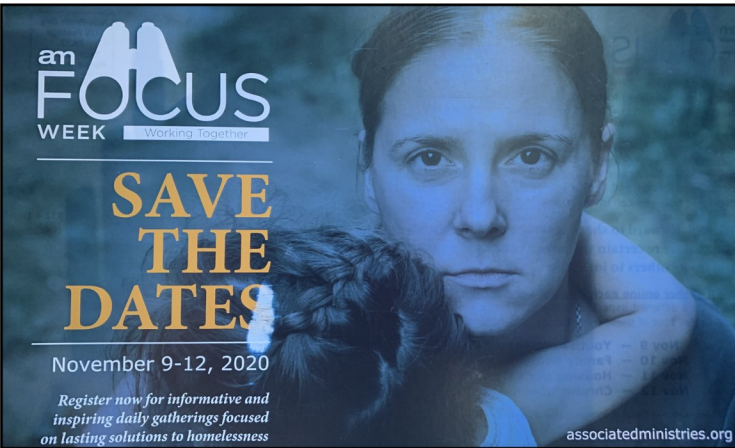

Their strategic programming outlined below includes center-based programming for families and children, while also conducting it safely and effectively during a pandemic. *Can you imagine being homeless and having the opportunity for a no-appointment-necessary-drop-in time for showers, laundry, cooking, computers and of course homework study time for your children?*

CCS/FHN programming and partnerships...

Partners in Pierce County's Coordinated Entry System, the entry point for homeless services in the county. Coordinated Entry hotline (253.682.3401)

Rapid Re-housing... affordable community housing as quickly as possible ... short-term supportive services and connections to community resources at an individualized level.

Permanent Supportive Housing... partners with 69 apartment units in Tacoma, Lakewood, and Fife to serve homeless families with complex needs and disabilities who need long term case management services to work on goals toward stability and independence.

Supportive Services for Veteran Families

This year is different, of course. For the 2020 Giving Holiday season, instead of wrapped gifts this year, FHN is requesting **Gift Cards of \$25 to \$50**.

FHN will coordinate with UCUP's Peace and Justice committee on the specific requests of each family. If you are wanting to participate please call/text Judy this month (240-994-8572). This will give us an idea of how many families we could support. Dorothy and Judy will help with assigning and pick-up and delivery of the cards to FHN.
