Suquamish UCC calls Amara Oden as their pastor

I'm thrilled to share that I have received a call to a church!

Suquamish UCC, one hour from Tacoma, voted me in as their full-time solo pastor right before Christmas. I start serving their church in early January. Happily, I and my family will stay here in Tacoma and I'll combine telecommuting and being there in person. It is a lovely church, active and warm and community- and justice-focused, with a deep contemplative component. I couldn't be more pleased with the fit, pleased with finding a full-time call, pleased with being able to stay in Tacoma with my family.

I have such deep gratitude to United Church for the way you welcomed my whole family so graciously, and jumped in to support me in pursuing my call. Even as you were getting to know me, even though the pandemic, I felt UCUP cheering me on, supporting me and my family in spiritual and practical ways as I finished my degree. While I launch into my new life as pastor, I will take with me the lessons of being in community with you all.



Pastor's letter ~

In the past 21 months it seems like one set of uncertainties and anxieties has simply been replaced with another set. How will we enter this third year of living life in the midst of a global pandemic? In the midst of anxiety and grief, this season of living life in a pandemic can be a holy time as well.

Keith Bellizzi, professor of Human Development and Family Sciences, at the University of Connecticut wrote: "Uncertainty has the power to fuel positive change, and even inspire creativity, but only if individuals are able to adapt. Resilience — the ability to adapt to adversity — is key. Research has shown that when faced with adversity and uncertainty, resilient people engage with controllable aspects of their lives, they maintain healthy social support systems, they are able to regulate their emotions to help blunt the stressor and they look for the good amid the stress. In fact, survival and resilience is the norm, not the exception. Stories of resilience and thriving has a rich history and we need to remind ourselves that our track record as individuals for getting through rough times is better than we might think."

The philosopher Alfred North Whitehead asserted that one aspect of creativity is to initiate novelty to match novel circumstances. These are novel circumstances to be sure.

During the liturgical season of Epiphany we will enter into a worship series called "*Drawn In: Living the Creative Life with God.*" We will connect with our inherent creativity and nurture this foundational aspect of being human, giving us renewed energy for passionate work, delightful play, and creative problem solving.

Read through the scriptures below and imagine what creative gifts God has instilled in you

- Genesis 1:1 *In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.*
- Exodus 35:31, 32, 35 *God has filled them with the Spirit of God, with wisdom, with understanding, with knowledge and with all kinds of skills— 32 to make artistic designs for work in gold, silver and bronze, to cut and set stones, to work in wood, and to engage in all kinds of crafts. God has filled them with skill to do all kinds of work as engravers, designers, embroiderers in blue, purple and scarlet yarn and fine linen, and weavers—all of them skilled workers and designers.*
- Romans 12:6 *We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us.*
- 2 Corinthians 5:17 *Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!*
- Ephesians 2:10 *For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.*
- Jeremiah 29:11 *For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.*

In Exodus 31 and 35, God gave Bezalel creative gifts on the construction of the tabernacle of God and God expected him to teach these skills to others. These creative abilities included intelligence, knowledge, and skill in his craft. Just like Bezalel, we were created to glorify God in good works.

We will enter into this six week worship series of being *Drawn In* to the heart of God, with these key themes (in bold), as we enter God's **dream** for our creative lives to give us hope and a future; we will **hover** there to get in touch with our deepest passions. At that point, we may take the **risk** of acting on what we've discerned. And then we **listen** and pay attention to the information we received. We **reintegrate** to further refine the vision and adjust course where necessary. Finally, we **rest** and celebrate what we have accomplished with God and invite further inspiration.

Pastor's letter ~ con't

During the series, I may ask to interview you about what creative gifts God has given you, and invite you to share your creative process with the congregation. At the end of the series, what fun we could have in sharing our creations or how God has inspired creativity within us.

Sarah Bessy offers this quote for writers, knitters, bakers, crafters, and everyone who creates: *"I've stopped asking whether or not anyone needs my writing or my knitting. Because I need it. I do it because I was made to it, because it makes me feel fully alive to do it. Because I'm working out what God has already worked in. Because I believe even a knitting pattern brings glory to God. Because this life was redeemed by Jesus and this is a bit of redemption right now. It's a bit of beauty and wholeness, an act of discipleship to Creator, a resistance of professionalization and commercialization to simply take time to participate in the wonder of stepping back to pronounce something as entirely good."*

Our lives have changed significantly in the pandemic, but when we hear God's call and respond creatively, may we face the challenges of our personal and congregational lives in the spirit of Lamentations 3:22: *The steadfast love of God never ceases, they are new every morning.*

After a few chilly Sundays in the sanctuary, we're pleased to report that two new furnaces have been installed and warm air is once again circulating in the sanctuary. The two old furnaces that served the sanctuary space failed, and the facilities committee and board determined that, given the age of the old furnaces and the high cost to repair, it was time to install two new units. Total cost for the furnaces and installation was just over \$14,000. Many thanks to Don Thompson who shepherded the process, met with technicians, gathered bids, and stayed at the church while the contractor's crew completed the installation. The work was completed just in time to keep the building warm during the week-long deep freeze at the end of December.
