WORSHIP THEME FOR LENT and LENTEN STUDY 2022 Good Enough: Embracing the Imperfections of Life and Faith


Our worship series for Lent and our Lenten study this year is based on a book of devotions by Kate Bowler and Jessica Richie: *"Good Enough: 40ish Devotionals for a Life of Imperfection"*. Kate Bowler is a seminary history professor, and author. She has two recent New York Times bestselling books - (*Everything Happens for a Reason: And Other Lies I've Loved*, and *No Cure for Being Human And Other Truths I Need to Hear*) - about dealing with the pressure to "live your best life now" when life throws you curveballs that make constant upward achievement very difficult... like the cancer she has dealt with over the last few years.

We live in a culture that describes the good life as continuous upward mobility—climbing ladders of prosperity with increasingly fabulous experiences and adventures. But life happens. We are not necessarily moving upward but trying to repair the rung we've just slipped from. We are still in the midst of great disturbance from "the way we imagined" life to be. Dreams have been thwarted by pandemic through loss of life, health, and economic security. What if we stopped climbing and started fertilizing, watering, and blooming right where we find ourselves? The symbolism for the series will be a ladder with plants on it, inviting us to nurture what actually is, not continually climb the ladder of success.

In the *Good Enough* book of devotions, Kate Bowler and Jessica Richie offer invitations to seek alternatives to the pressure of perfectionism. You are invited to add these daily devotions as part of your Lent practice and consider joining our Lenten Study to deepen your experience.

Here is a description of the book: *Good Enough: 40ish Devotions for a Life of Imperfection* gives permission for all those who need to hear that there are some things you can fix—and some things you can't. And it's okay that life isn't always better. We hope to offer fresh Christian imagination for how truth, beauty, and meaning can be discovered amid the chaos of life.

Lent marks the 40 days leading up to Easter, mirroring the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness. It is a practice that began during the 4th century as a way to prepare Christians for the holiest days of the year. During Lent, we ask God to show us the world as it is. We begin with the reality of our finitude rubbed on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday—from dust we were made, to dust we shall return.

UCUP Establishes the Win & Nels Bjarke Memorial Fund

The UCUP Board voted to establish the Win & Nels Bjarke Memorial Fund which will be invested to get a better return than a bank or credit union. The original proposal was to direct the fund toward education, but after considerable discussion the fund was left open ended so that the income could be used for any church project or need. Obviously, supporting youth and adult education would take a priority, but it can serve the church more widely by leaving it open-ended.



The Board will also discuss at its next meeting whether or not to establish a general memorial fund that would allow donations in memory of various individuals to accumulate and generate income for the church. No restrictions would be placed on these funds, but funds given in memory would enrich this fund as well. Open-ended donations serve the church most broadly, as designated donations can restrict our growth. All contributions in memory of church members will be acknowledged by the Congregational Care Committee. We are deeply grateful for contributions in memory of our beloved members and want to see these serve UCUP in many ways.

Mary Jane Jones Remembrance

Mary Jane Jones, 98, died peacefully on January 15, 2022. She was born on June 14, 1923, in Morris, Illinois to Mary and Stephen Toth. When she was three, her family moved to Stevensville, Montana, where she lived until graduation from high school in 1941.

Mary then moved to Tacoma to attend business college. Her schooling was cut short when she accepted a wartime job at the Tacoma shipyard. She married Ralph Jones in 1942 and moved to Pasco, Washington, to be with Ralph while he received his Navy war training. Mary returned to Tacoma in February 1944 where she became the all-important bookkeeper and phone receptionist for her husband Ralph's commercial refrigeration business. Mary raised four children, was an active member of St. Paul's Methodist Church and later at United Church in University Place.

Mary has always been one to volunteer. She assisted with Girl Scout troops, Bluebirds, classroom tutoring, adult ESL tutoring, working at the food bank, and helping with church office activities.

Mary loved flowers. One of her greatest joys was landscaping her yard and later her small patio area with bursts of color and greenery. She was known for her great pie baking, especially her lemon meringue pies. Her many passions included crossword puzzles, embroidery, reading, and writing. She wrote a memoir titled *Mary-Go-Round* and a collection of family remembrances called *Some Days Along the Way*, as well as countless short pieces about family events and family members.

Mary will be remembered for her love of family and friends, cheerful nature, zest for learning, passion for writing, joy of reading, her sense of humor and her thoughtfulness. She always saw the sunny side of people.

UMC & UCC Leadership Respond to Crisis in Ukraine

A pastoral letter from Methodist Bishop Christian Alsted in light of the tragic events in Ukraine

Bishop Alsted serves the Nordic, Baltic and Eurasian countries, including Russia and Ukraine.

There is war in Europe. Russia has invaded Ukraine, which is a free independent democracy. War and violence are evil and always entail considerable human costs. The Christian message points to the path of reconciliation and never to war and violence, as a solution to conflicts. The Social Principles of the Methodist Church say: "We deplore war and urge the peaceful settlement of all disputes among nations. We yearn for the day when there will be no more war and people will live together in peace and justice."

In the face of this evil, we pray for a logic different from the one based on geopolitical competition. We pray for a change of hearts and minds of leaders, we pray for de-escalation and dialogue instead of violence and war.

We stand with the United Methodists in Ukraine in prayer for protection, reconciliation and peace. We pray for pastors, leaders and congregations in the United Methodist Church in Ukraine; may God grant that their witness of reconciliation and peace will bring strength and hope to the Ukrainian people.

In the coming week we will enter the season of Lent, which in the church is a time for prayer and soul-searching. I call on all our congregations to intercede for the people of Ukraine, and for the leaders in the world, who have the power to bring an end to war. I call on all our congregations to pray and fast for reconciliation and peace in the world. May God open our eyes to the things that make for peace, may God protect us all from the escalation and spreading of war, and may we follow on the path of truth and peace.



Statement on Ukraine from the Methodist Presidency

We are horrified and heartbroken as we witness the violent assault on Ukraine by the Russian military. This devastating action and ensuing loss of life have rightly been condemned across the world. It is a very clear violation of the UN Charter and as such imperils the foundation upon which international security is built and on which we all depend. We regret the failure to build an understanding with Russia and we pray for the Ukrainian and Russian peoples. May aggression cease and dialogue, justice and peace be established.

As the attention of the world turns to the ignored cries for peace from the people of Ukraine, we the officers of the United Church of Christ join our prayers with those of churches and people of faith all over the globe that the attack against Ukraine will cease. As a Just Peace Church, the UCC calls for the de-escalation of violence and a return to diplomatic negotiations, the only true way conflict ever ceases. We urge our members to pray throughout the day for peace and protection against the evils of war for the people whose lives and wellbeing are in danger, and to make this Sunday a day of collective prayer and fasting for a peace that only God can bring.

Holy God, Hear our prayers for all those who will die today because of war in Ukraine and other war-torn countries all over this world. Grant them an end to the suffering of this world and eternal peace that is only found in You.

We pray for the people of Ukraine, Russia, and all nations — that war and bloodshed can be avoided and a new, just peace can be forged out of this crisis. We ask God grant wisdom to the leaders of nations, calling them to end provocation on all sides and invest instead in "the things that make for peace" as called for in all our faith traditions (Luke 19:41-2).

We pray for an end to the deep insecurity and mistrust on all sides, and call on leaders to build trust, based not on military might or alliances, but on the basis of our shared future and common humanity. Now is a time in which past harm should be acknowledged and addressed, and new partnerships can be envisioned.

We pray for and call on our leaders to have the courage to take small, verifiable, and independent steps toward peace, inviting others to reciprocate. Now is time to invest in conflict resolution, diplomacy and international cooperation — not more weapons which only escalate tension in the region.

Be with those suffering in ways that we cannot. Protect them from devastation in ways those positioned in authority will not. Shield and comfort them as they confront the terror of violence that surrounds them. Hold them close to your heart and stay the hand of the enemies against them. Give us the courage and the strength to cry aloud against wickedness in high places that dare to harm others made in your image.

Comfort the children and heed their cries to be saved from harm in this world.

Make us a people who love our children, all of our children, more than we love greed, power, and control. Overturn governments of tyranny wherever they are found. Disrupt the intentions of evil and give us power to stand against demonic forces of greed and control. Grant that peace and justice come to warring nations by the hands of those courageous enough to stand and study war no more. Let Thy kin-dom come on earth as it is in heaven, we pray. In Jesus' name, Amen.

Reflections on Tribal Acknowledgement

Pierce County includes 1,806 square miles of ceded lands of four Federally-recognized Tribes: the Puyallup Tribe, Nisqually Tribe, Muckleshoot Tribe, and Squaxin Island Tribe. These Tribes are sovereign governments that predate the founding of the United States, and their sovereignty is an inherent right that has existed since time immemorial, recognized with a government-to-government relationship by the United States.


Puyallup Tribal Language Program Signs

Have you noticed the beautiful signs in Twulshootseed that are in front of the church and in yards around the Tacoma area? These signs are part of ongoing efforts by the Puyallup Tribal Language program to promote the preservation of their native language. Twulshootseed is the language spoken by tribes living in the Puget Sound area of Washington State.

The City of Tacoma supported the language program last summer with the printing of the signs designed by native artists. The sign I chose for my yard translates the tribal virtues into English: "be kind, be helpful, be caring". If you've had the opportunity to visit a foreign country, think of how delighted native speakers are when you attempt basic phrases in their language. It's the same for native American tribes.

FAITH ACTION NETWORK

February 10, 2022, the Faith Action Network's Interfaith Advocacy Day was held. Five members of our church and three more people from the 28th legislative district met to voice our concerns on a wide range of topics. The opening session included prayers from two faith leaders and a talk with a representative from the Bremerton area. Her testimony to us was compelling because she has lived experience from behind bars and legislates with an eye of compassion toward inmates and resulting experiences from being released. The bills she sponsors tend to be aimed at reducing recidivism and at education for those who are incarcerated.

We also heard from Kristin Ang, who has replaced Paul Benz as the coordinator for legislative action at FAN. She discussed the bills that are still alive during the session that she hoped we would support. We met with our district counterparts, and then we all attended two educational sessions where the particular bills under discussion were more clearly focused upon.

In the afternoon, we met with legislative aides for Mari Leavitt and T'wina Nobles and shared our mutual concerns, along with our asks for their support on various issues. There was no contact with Dan Bronoski's office because they were particularly busy on this day and had no available time slots for us. The legislative aides were very helpful and promised to pass along our issues and concerns and thanks for the work our legislators are doing.
