## Beguiled BY BEAUTY

*Cultivating a Life of Contemplation & Compassion*

Psalm 27:4 One thing I ask of you, Divine Goodness, one thing I seek: that I may dwell in your house all the days of my life, to gaze on your beauty and to meditate in your Temple.

Over these last weeks of summer our worship will be based on a book called "Beguiled by Beauty", written in 2020 by Dr. Wendy Farley. We will enter spiritual practices of contemplation and noticing beauty in the midst of our lives. Dr. Farley writes that "The difficulty and crisis of the world is overwhelming. It is virtually impossible to bear it without very deep resources."

The world is on fire, and beauty abounds. How do we hold both of these truths at the same time, without succumbing to despair or denying the reality of suffering? For the next month, we will knock on the door of the beauty of creation, summoning courage to open our hearts to the beauty and suffering all around us, to fall in love with the sacredness of the world in all its brokenness.

Dr. Farley invites us to make a shift from a moral obligation to do right to a deep desire for all beings to be right - whole and beloved. She gives us tools to notice that the world we have fallen in love with is our own - to have a rich, courageous, generous, and joyful life.

The title of her book comes from Pseudo-Dionysius, an early 6th century theologian who described God as "beguiled by beauty." The Creator was lured by a longing for beauty and so set in motion a world of immense diversity & goodness. We were made for this Divine Goodness. We were made inherently worthy, not by our "doing," but by our simply being. All things are beautiful—not by a standard of "pretty" as seen by our eyes, but by an essence of sacred worth that is sensed by the spirit. This is the root and heart of compassion and justice. Practices of contemplation help us train our gaze to these deeper truths. In this worship series we will dwell with the God of Divine Goodness, deeply in love with us, and practice ways to return that love as we fall more deeply in love with creation and with one another.


## POTLUCK & BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS -

## Pastor's letter ~

When I was in college, I went on an overnight sailing trip out of Bellingham. It was the first time sleeping on a boat and awaking to the most glorious sunrise that filled the entire horizon and water before us with light. It might be one of the few mystical experiences I have had in my life - where I felt infused with light and love, and felt a sense of love and connection and compassion for all around me.

Three years ago, Angie and I embarked on a whirlwind trip of National Parks in Utah & Colorado - from Arches, to Canyonlands to Mesa Verde to the golden aspens and mountain peaks driving to Telluride, to Capitol Reef. I became more deeply aware of the beauty of that land and a deeper sense of connection to the divine, to the earth, to all created beings. A sense of being totally alive, noticing beauty all around me. One morning we woke up at 3am to wait for sunrise at Arches National Park. As night shifted to dawn, I had the overwhelming sense of being so small in the vastness of the universe that I forgot about myself, with an overwhelming sense of gratefulness.

During these last weeks of summer, we will be entering into a worship series based on a book called *Beguiled by Beauty*, written by Dr. Wendy Farley, who has taught as a professor of theological studies at Emory University, the Graduate Theological Union, and University of Redlands. I had the privilege of meeting Wendy in the fall of 2019 when she led a retreat on Orcas Island for Tacoma area clergy. It was a few months before the pandemic started and before she published this book in 2020. It was on that retreat that I realized - Beauty is not a luxury; beauty is a necessity to life.

“Beguiled by beauty” is a phrase Dr. Farley borrowed from the writings of a 6th century monk, known as Pseudo-Dionysius. He wrote: “*Divine goodness fell in love with creation and so was compelled to bring it into being.*” He believed that the beauty of creation beguiled God; God fell in love with the cosmos, was charmed by all life's interrelatedness, and held deep affection for all beings. On our retreat on Orcas Island almost 3 years ago, Wendy said “Beauty is the pathway to forget ourselves.” I found that concept so freeing. The ancient world thought about beauty as being that which distracts us from our ego-preoccupation. Beauty entices us so that something other than our own minds, our sufferings, our anxiety gets our attention. It gets us outside of ourselves and we enter into blissful self-forgetfulness. It's not that our specific needs or worries cease to exist, but they fade into the background, and the world becomes real and beautiful to us. Beauty is a threshold into the Divine way of seeing and can bring healing into our fragmented, anxious lives.

A few nights ago, Angie picked up some ravioli with ricotta and Romano cheese from Trader Joe's. At one point, she said it was Pepe Cacio Raviolia - with infused pepper in it. In the very next bite, I said, “Wow! You can taste the pepper in it!” I was oblivious to all the varied nuances of taste in what I was eating. Once she said something, it brought my attention, awareness and appreciation to the meal. Sometimes we need to be invited to notice in order to be aware of the beauty around us. It is easy to stop noticing with intention, to be lulled into complacency of the beauty of the earth, of divine goodness. Mary Oliver - nature mystic, and praise poet - grew up with an abusive father and a neglectful mother. Mary said she barely escaped her troubled childhood if not for the beauty of nature that saved her. Every morning she would go into the woods at 5am as a daily discipline. She carried a notebook and would write while she walked. This poem, “*The Other Kingdoms*,” was written after one of those early morning walks.

*Consider the other kingdoms.*

*The trees, for example, with their mellow-sounding titles: oak, aspen, willow.*

*Or the creatures, with their thick fur, their shy and wordless gaze.*

*Their infallible sense of what their lives are meant to be.*

*Thus the world grows rich, grows wild,*

*and you, too, grow rich, grow sweetly wild, as you too were born to be.*

Like Mary Oliver, nature can take us to another kingdom where we grow rich and grow sweetly wild as we were born to be. The gospels portray Jesus regularly retreating to the wilderness for prayer and restoration, in the midst of so much injustice in his 1st century world.

I invite you over the next month on a journey of contemplation to behold divine beauty all around us. May we drink from a deeper well, and may our lives become open and attuned to divine beauty and immersed in everyday joy, sorrow, delight, suffering, and routine.

## United Church in University Place

### **Statement on Gun Violence**

We, the members of United Church in University Place, stand with the United Methodist Church and United Church of Christ in condemning all acts of gun violence and grieving the loss of life. We also stand in solidarity with the Faith Action Network and the Alliance for Gun Responsibility and applaud the gun legislation passed in the State of Washington in 2022, including restrictions on high-capacity magazines (SB 5078), restrictions on weapons in certain locations, such as school board meetings and election facilities (HB 1630), and closure of the ghost gun loophole (HB 1705). We commit to continued advocacy for common-sense gun laws, including the following:

- Mandatory background checks for all gun sales, including gun shows and private sales
- The prohibition of further sales of military-style assault (e.g. AR-15-style) rifles
- The prohibition of high-capacity magazines
- The extension of waiting periods to all firearm sales
- The implementation of red-flag laws
- The expansion of mental healthcare as a guaranteed right and coverage to all persons


Concerts are about one hour in length.
