Each year we receive a special World Communion Sunday offering that will be split between our two denominations: The United Methodist Church and The United Church of Christ.

**Neighbors in Need** is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States to support the Council for American Indian Ministry the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants.

In **The United Methodist Church**, this offering helps students from around the world reach their full potential through scholarships, training and mentoring. Half goes to scholarships for ethnic minorities in the United States; half goes to the Central Conferences outside the United States to be used for educational purposes.

## Pastor's letter ~

*Our UCC & UMC conferences are in a time of discernment and transition. In September, Conference Minister Rev. Mike Denton finished his role of 15 years serving as the PNW UCC Conference Minister. He is now serving as pastor at South Congregational Church in Pittsfield, MA. Bishop Elaine Stanovsky will retire in December 2022, after serving six years as Bishop of the Greater Northwest Episcopal Area. As you read the two articles below about the process for our transition, please be in prayer for our two denominational conferences.*

### From Rev. Tara Leininger, Moderator Board of Directors, Pacific Northwest UCC:

Please join me in welcoming the Reverend Dr. Courtney Stange-Tregear as our Acting Conference Minister! Courtney has served in the Pacific Northwest Conference for the past six years as Minister for Church Vitality, and previously served as Acting Conference Minister during Rev. Mike Denton's sabbatical. She has been the staff support for the PNC Stewardship Committee and the PNC Church Development Committee. She has led retreats and annual meetings, created the weekly moderator's group to support local church leadership during the pandemic, and so much more. Courtney was instrumental in the PNC's participation in "Giving Tuesday," a national day of giving fundraising event, for which our conference received national recognition.

I appreciate her keen listening, her grounded presence, and her skills as a creative problem-solver as she as she's supported the PNC board and our strategy team. She is a gifted preacher and a passionate, spirit-filled, theologically-grounded minister. Under her leadership the vitality ministry has led the conference priority of deepening relationships and has increased our capacity to do justice, love kindness, and to walk humbly with God.

Courtney has a BA from St. John's College, a Masters of Arts from the University of Leeds, a Master of Divinity from Andover Newton Seminary at Yale Divinity School, and a Doctor of Ministry from Bexley Seabury Seminary at the University of Chicago.

Our conference is a covenant between each of our churches, with our camps, with all our clergy, and with each of you. Just like a UCC church is led by its members, a UCC conference is led by each of you who participate. The conference staff supports the work of the conference, but it is really all of you who make the conference possible. # In Search of a Few Good Bishops

As a Pacific Northwest Conference delegate to the Western Jurisdiction, I have been focused on our task of preparing for the election of several Bishops for this Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church.

A little background information. We have had five bishops for the Western Jurisdiction (the Western 1/3 of the United States including Alaska and the Pacific Islands). Given the upcoming retirements which are mandated, we will be reduced to two bishops, and perhaps only one. We, the western jurisdiction delegates have clearly stated that we cannot function with less than four, and ideally all five Bishops in place. We have 32 candidates to consider which is a daunting task for such important discernment. To add to the complexity of the task, much of our discernment is occurring online. We will meet in November in Salt Lake City for the final discernment.

## Here is a bit of what is involved.

- There are excellent candidates and a very wide diversity among them.
- The possible length of service candidates could serve vary from 5-6 years to over 30 before they reach the mandatory age of retirement.
- So far, we have heard from each candidate for 4 minutes each answering each of 4 questions. This doesn't sound like much, but it's been over 8 hours of video time.
- As the PNW delegation we can meet with key candidates for a longer question and answer time. This will involve 10 more meetings within the next two weeks.
- Then we need to confer with Ore/ID and Alaska to talk about shared criteria and values for episcopal candidates. This should narrow our list.

I was an observer at the 2016 Jurisdictional Meeting and saw the process of electing a bishop. There were 17 votes taken (this was only for one bishop). There would be prayers and moments of reflection between each vote. In between some of the ballots delegations could meet with candidates for further discussion and questions. This was the high art of discernment and it is not easy nor rushed.

Even I can become impatient with process. Had I held to the "let's get this over" mindset, I would not have heard, seen and felt the mystery of God moving among the delegates. I cannot tell you how or when it happened, but movement happened, consensus arose, and by the final vote we knew it was God's choice. And Karen Oliveto was elected. I deeply believe this will happen again in November!

## Here's what I'm looking for in a candidate

- Would this individual be able to lead in the PNW/GNW culture? The Greater Northwest is very diverse.
- Does this person have a deep and tested faith?
- Can this person embrace the changes coming to the UMC at both the local and global levels and help us find our new path?
- Can this individual listen deeply to us, all of us and draw forth our visions?
- Does this person have the leadership style, skills and experience to draw together clergy, laity, community connections and move us across our many divisions and into our future?
- Does this candidate support inclusivity at all levels and functions of the church?
- What does this candidate see as his or her priority as a bishop?

These are not in order of priority, and I may find a few more. Please pray for all of us involved in this process, November 1 – 5 in Salt Lake City.



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## WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY October 2nd

Wear an orange shirt to worship in solidarity with indigenous children attending Canadian & U.S Indian Boarding Schools.

The Orange Shirt is a symbol of the harm done to the indigenous children, who were forced to attend Indian Boarding Schools. In the U.S., Orange Shirt Day was observed officially for the first time on September 30, 2021. Someday soon it is hoped that September 30<sup>th</sup> will be commemorated as the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, as it is in Canada.

The orange shirt comes from a true story about six-year-old Phyllis Webstad, a Shuswap native, who began school at St. Joseph Mission Residential School near Williams Lake, British Columbia, in 1973. To ease her fears as she boarded a bus alone, Phyllis' grandmother gave her a brand-new orange shirt. When Phyllis arrived at the school, she was stripped of her clothing, including the new orange shirt, then she was given a bath, her long hair was cut short, and she was issued a school uniform. Phyllis never saw her orange shirt again. Phyllis attended the school at Williams Lake for only one year, nevertheless, the experience contributed to low self-esteem.

She says, "that feeling of worthlessness and insignificance, ingrained in me from my first day at the mission, affected the way I lived my life for many years. Even now, when I know nothing could be further than the truth, I still sometimes feel that I don't matter."

Phyllis' story is relatively mild, compared to other indigenous experiences, but her story was traumatizing. Other children, who attended boarding schools for longer periods of time, lost their native languages, their native cultures, the nurturing presence of their families and sometimes their lives. They were exposed to cold, hunger, fatal diseases, like tuberculosis, even beatings and rapes. Many children died at the residential schools. In some cases, parents were not advised of their child's death, and children were buried in unmarked graveyards on school grounds.

In the summer of 2021, and partly as a response to the over 200 graves discovered at Kamloops in Canada in June 2021, U.S. Interior Secretary, Deb Haaland, announced the creation of an Indian School Initiative to quantify the problems and to create a way for Indigenous people to heal from their boarding school experience. The US Dept of Interior released the first portion of their promised Indian Boarding School report on May 11, 2022. The findings stated: "The investigation found that from 1819 to 1969, the federal Indian boarding school system consisted of 408 federal schools across 37 states, or then territories, including 21 schools in Alaska and 7 schools in Hawaii." In addition, approximately 53 burial sites were identified. The federal investigation will continue, and the number of burial sites is expected to increase.

The May 2022 report also announced the launch of "The Road to Healing." "This year-long tour will include travel across the country to allow American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian survivors of the federal Indian boarding school system the opportunity to share their stories, to help connect communities with trauma-informed support, and to facilitate collection of a permanent oral history." In this way oral histories can be collected before all survivors pass away.

The May 2022 report lists 14 federal Indian Boarding Schools in Washington state at these locations: **Oakville, Kettle Falls, Tacoma, White Swan, Davenport, Neah Bay, Squaxin Island, Taholah, Olympia, Federal Way, Omak, Tonasket, Tulalip Bay (Priest's Point).** Many people in the U.S. have no knowledge of the Indian Boarding School era. It's time for this history to become broadly known, to listen to the indigenous accounts, to make apologies and to allow for healing. What better place to seek truth and reconciliation than through our churches?





## Halloween Candy Needed!!

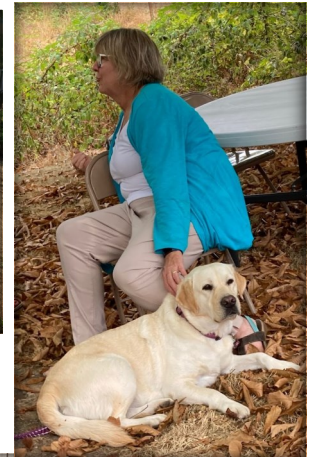

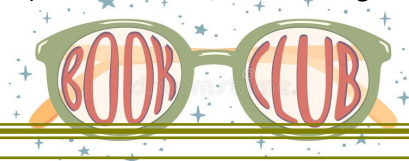


## "DON'T FORGET" Book Club opportunity

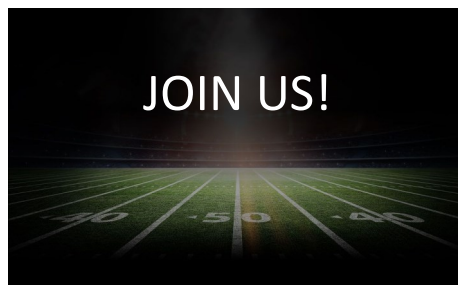
