What and where has your legacy come from? The definition:

something transmitted by or received from an ancestor or predecessor or from the past.

Pastor's letter ~

We just finished the third week of Lent with the focus on the Woman at the Well from John 4. I have always loved this story, with its many nuances and layers and rich conversation. In fact, this passage is the longest recorded conversation in the gospels between Jesus and another individual. I love it when I learn something new in researching scripture. A legend arose about the Samaritan woman in Orthodox history. When this unnamed Samaritan woman was baptized at Pentecost by the apostles of Christ, they gave her the name of **Photini** which means “**the enlightened one.**” In Greek sermons from the 4th- 14th century, Photini is called Apostle and Evangelist. The Samaritan Woman is compared to the male disciples and apostles and found to surpass them. Byzantine hagiographers - those who study of the lives of saints - explored the story of the Samaritan woman. St. Photini lived in first century Palestine. She began a missionary career, traveling and preaching the good news of the Messiah’s coming, his death and resurrection. She had quite a following, with everyone talking about her. During the reign of Emperor Nero in the first century, excessive cruelty was displayed as Christians were persecuted and martyred. Eventually, Nero had her arrested, and threw her into a dry well, where once again a vision of Jesus came to her before her death and she surrendered her soul to God in the year 66AD. There are ancient prayers in the Greek tradition made to Photini for her assistance in dark times. She is known in the Eastern tradition as **Photini, the luminous one.** Eastern Christians remember her as a Holy Martyr and refer to her as Equal-to-the-Apostles.

*O Almighty Saviour, Who did pour forth water for the Hebrews from a solid rock:
You did come to the Land of Samaria, and addressed a woman, whom You did attract to faith in You,
and she has now attained life in the heavens everlasting. Amen.*



Artist Statement on *Living Water inspired by John 4:5-42* by Lauren Wright Pittman from “A Sanctified Art”

In a quick Google image search of this story, I noticed that, in most of the art, Jesus and the Samaritan woman are almost never on the same level. In my piece, the positioning of Jesus and the Samaritan woman is inspired by the work of Karoline M. Lewis in her commentary on John. She introduces a fresh way of looking at this text, with a focus on their “mutuality of need.” Jesus needs water to drink, and the woman needs living water. Karoline writes: “Jesus needs her to be a witness, and she needs Jesus to invite her into this new identity.”

In this image, their body positioning is mirrored, with their eyes on the same plane. Where their arms overlap becomes a vibrant blue, creating a water drop with a dove in it, representing the living water that springs forth from their mutual need and relationship. Each of their clothing is patterned with the other’s need. In Jesus’ clothing are simplified “springs of water gushing up to eternal life.”

In the Samaritan woman’s clothes, her water jar is positioned upright and poured out, representing her wrestling with whether she will interact with this man—and further, whether he is the awaited Messiah.

The image is subtly divided in half by slight shifts in color value. There is a chasm between them socially, culturally, religiously. Referencing a primary dispute between the Jews and the Samaritans, their places of worship are in the background: on the left is the temple in Jerusalem, and on the right is Mount Gerizim.

In the center is the Samaritan woman’s vessel. We are not told whether she fills the jar or gives Jesus water, however, we are told that she leaves the jar behind. Her need is not the water in the well; her need is for grounding in a new identity, and to be seen for who she really is. She needs to not be defined by the worst parts of her life, the number of her husbands, or others’ assumptions, but to be seen through the lens of mutual need—to be seen as one of the first witnesses of the Messiah and now a vessel of living water herself.

THE PRAYER CHAIN



Interfaith Advocacy Day in Olympia Energizes FAN Action!

We are grateful to the amazing advocates who made the trek to Olympia yesterday for Interfaith Advocacy Day (IFAD) – a joyful return to in-person advocacy! We are also grateful to those who viewed online and took action remotely. 207 people from 36 districts attended over 87 meetings with their legislators. They brought their experiences, knowledge, and passion for justice to decisionmakers.



We started the morning at United Churches of Olympia. Lutheran Bishops Shelley Bryan Wee of ELCA Northwest Synod and Rick Jaech of ELCA Southwestern Synod shared reflections on how we are called by our faith traditions to learn and to act for justice. FAN staff provided overviews of the day and our legislative agenda. We were delighted to be visited by 41st District Rep. My-Linh Thai, whose passionate message resonated with ours: that love guides her policymaking decisions as she calls on her colleagues to do what is right. Workshops on each category of our legislative agenda were expertly presented by our coalition partners and FAN leaders. Advocates caucused with others from their legislative district and planned their afternoon meetings.

We are grateful to the WA Poor Peoples' Campaign for bringing members to advocate with FAN, as we echoed their chant: "Forward Together! Not One Step Back!" Let's keep the momentum going throughout the year.

Robert Brown, rosemary Jones, Neva Laurie-Berry, Judy Thierry, and Pastor Cathy were able to attend in person.



Tacoma Community House ~ Thank-you

Thank you for the calendars, greeting cards, scratch pads, and magazines that you left for me to deliver to immigrant and refugee families attending classes at Tacoma Community House in Tacoma. I delivered these items as well as new hats, gloves, and socks that I had purchased to TCH in February before I attended their monthly Executive Board meeting. This was our first fully in-person, face-to-face meeting since COVID began three years ago!

Since last November, I have been interacting with two immigrant families—one from Afghanistan and one from Mexico. While the adults and older children attend language classes at TCH, the youngest ones stay at home with Mom. I have donated to both families lots of games, sticker books, puzzles, Dr. Suess ABC flash cards and hats, gloves, socks and blankets for the kids. Just this past weekend, I even gathered up shoes for the seven Afghan children from the Clothing Closet at Fircrest United Methodist Church. Thank you to Sandy Holliday!!

On Friday, April 28, TCH will hold its first in-person luncheon at the Hotel Murano since 2019!!

As a long-time member of the United Methodist Women (now United Women in Faith), I love to ask my friends to attend the luncheon and share a table with me. While the luncheon is complementary, TCH hopes to raise significant funds at the event to support the work of TCH and the REACH Center.
